### Did You Know?



#### **The temperature inside a vehicle, even with the windows cracked or rolled down, can reach over 140 degrees Fahrenheit?**

Never leave children, pets, or those who require special care in a parked car or vehicle during periods of intense summer heat even with the windows partially opened. Exposure to such high temperatures can kill within a matter of minutes.

"Think of your parked car as an oven," says Jennifer Tolle, executive director of [Prevent Child Abuse North Carolina](#) and co-chair of the NC Child Fatality Task Force. "Your car becomes like an oven in a matter of minutes on a hot summer day. You should no more leave your child in the car, even with the windows rolled down, than you should allow your child to sit in the oven in your home."

### **Town Forms Agricultural and Farmland Study Advisory Committee**



At its May 28, 2008 meeting the Town Board authorized the formation of the Agricultural and Farmland Study Advisory Committee (SAC) to assist the Town with the development of the Agricultural and Farmland Protection Plan. The following members were appointed to the SAC:

The Agriculture and Farmland Protection Plan emerged from the 2005 Comprehensive Plan's recommendation for the development of a Farm and Open Space Protection Plan. The Town was successful in applying for a grant from New York State Department of Agriculture and Markets (NYSDAM) in the amount of \$25,000 to fund the development of the Protection Plan. The purpose of the study is to work with individuals involved in the Towns agricultural industry to establish strategies that will result in the enhancement, management and continued viability of agriculture and farmland areas and lands in the Town of Bethlehem.

To assist the Town in preparing the study, NYSDAM requires that a Study Advisory Committee be organized to assist in the planning process. The SAC will be an advisory body that provides advice and recommendations to the study leaders, consisting of Behan Planning Associates and American Farmland Trust. The Department of Economic Development and Planning (DEDP) will provide staff support to the Agriculture and Farmland study.

The SAC will be responsible for providing general guidance for the study, and reviewing interim and final work products and reports. The SAC will be active for the duration of the planning study, which is estimated to be 12 - 18 months. It is envisioned that the members of the SAC will provide a sounding board and community perspective on study related issues, potential solutions and alternatives.

Major goals\* of the study will include:

- Document current farming operations and agricultural businesses to result in a status of agriculture and farming activities in Bethlehem.

- Identify opportunities/strategies to enhance, manage, and continue the viability of agriculture and farming in the Town.
- Analyze the following factors concerning any areas and lands proposed for participation:
  - Value to Bethlehem's agricultural economy
  - Value to Bethlehem's community character
  - Level of conversion pressure
  - Consequences of possible conversion to non agriculture and farming activities

(\*Based on Circular 1500 of the New York State Agriculture and Markets Law, Article 25AAA – Agricultural and Farmland Protection Programs).

Subsequent to the Town Board's action, an initial meeting with the Study Advisory Committee was held on June 23, 2008 to kick-off the Study. The meeting's agenda included a discussion and review of the existing lands that contain a farm or agricultural operation, receive an agricultural assessment, or are participants in the Albany County Agricultural District. As part of the data collection phase of the study, interviews with farmers and individuals involved in the agricultural industry were identified as an important exercise to gather information on the current trends in farming in the Town.

The next SAC meeting is scheduled for Monday, July 21, 2008 at 7PM in Town Hall Room 101. The SAC meetings are open to the public and all interested are welcome to attend. With summer storms upon us, power outages can occur. The Bethlehem Police Department will not know the scheduled return of power to areas within town, only National Grid can answer those questions. National Grid's web site has a link designed specifically for this, see <https://www1.nationalgridus.com/niagaramohawk/storm/storm.aspx>. On that page are such helpful items as what to do in a power outage, how to prepare your home for possible power outages, storm safety and recovery and a list of frequently asked questions. If you have access to the Internet (for example, from work, by calling a friend with power or via a wireless connection to your battery powered PC), **you can even report a power outage from that same page as well view your estimated restoration date and time.**

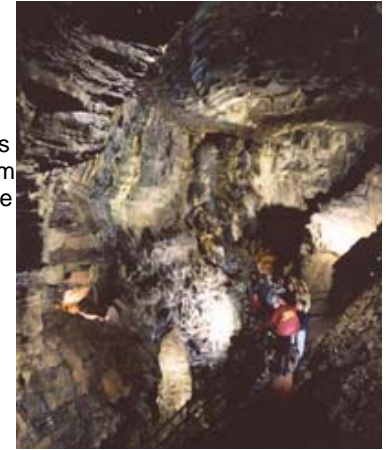
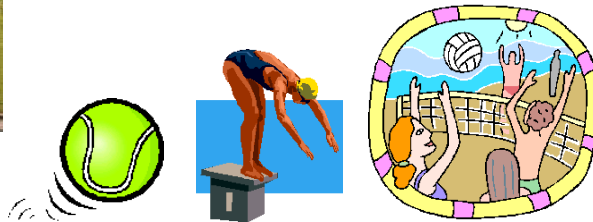

**You can now recycle CFLs at Home Depot**

The Home Depot has launched a national in-store, consumer compact fluorescent light (CFL) bulb recycling program at all 1,973 The Home Depot locations. There is no cost for the service, and the company notes that it is the first such offering by a retailer in the United States. The Home Depot Canada launched a CFL recycling program in November, 2007.

At each The HD store, customers can bring in any expired, unbroken CFL bulbs, and give them to the store associate behind the returns desk. The bulbs will be managed responsibly by an environmental management company who will coordinate CFL packaging, transportation and recycling to maximize safety and ensure environmental compliance.

**Save Time Paying Bills – Enjoy the Convenience of the Auto-pay Plan**



The automatic payment plan makes it easy for you to get your tax and/or water bills paid. All you need to do is fill out the easy enrollment form(s) and submit the form(s) to the Tax Office. We will set up the auto-pay plan with your bank. This information is confidential and will be used for Tax Department purposes only. About one week before your bill is due, your payment will be deducted from your designated account (checking or savings.) How will you know how much to deduct from your account? You will continue to receive your tax or water bill as usual and the bill will indicate the amount to be deducted and the date the deduction will occur. The bill will state 'bank draft'. 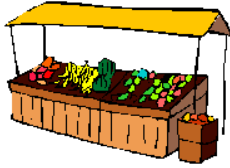
**For the 2008 School taxes**, the application deadline is **July 31**. The application form is available at the tax office or on the Town's website at <http://www.townofbethlehem.org/pages/forms/showforms.asp#Tax>.

The water bill auto-pay application form is on the back of each water bill and on the town's web site under [Online Services - Forms](#). Deadline to apply is at least one month before a payment is to be processed. Forms should be submitted to the Tax Office. Water payments are taken from your account a couple days before the bill is due.

### "DTV" is coming and sooner than you think!

Beginning February 18, 2009, federal law requires that full power television stations in the U.S. turn off their old technology using analog signals and broadcast only in digital format, potentially leaving millions of televisions displaying nothing but "snow."

The majority of consumers - anyone whose television is hooked up to a cable or satellite service or owns a digital set - will *not* be affected. Anyone who owns an older television that gets its signal via antenna, however, will need a converter box which the government will help finance. The converter boxes are expected to cost between \$50 and \$70 and will be available at most electronics stores. The National Telecommunications and Information Administration is accepting requests for two \$40 coupons per household to be used toward the purchase of the boxes. ### SUN AND WATER SAFETY TIPS

#### Sun Safety Tips

- Children receive 3 times more ultraviolet (UV) radiation than adults do each year and can benefit most from sun protection. For tips on how to protect kids from the sun, visit <http://www.msnbc.msn.com/id/13151714/>
- Apply sunscreen and lip balm with an SPF 15 or higher at least 20-30 minutes before going outdoors or into the water. Re-apply sunscreen every 2 hours or after swimming or physical activity. No sunscreen provides all day protection.
- The harmful effects of UV radiation accumulate over time; therefore, sun protection should be a lifelong habit, not just an occasional activity.
- Along with sunscreen, wear protective clothing, hat, shirt, shorts or pants, and sunglasses when not swimming. The more cover, the better!

#### Water Safety Tips

- Never leave young children alone – even for one minute!
- Never consider children WATER SAFE despite swimming skills!
- Never dive in shallow water or water of unknown depth
- Never run, always walk, around a pool deck
- Water skiing, tubing or the like requires TWO persons (one driving and one spotting) in the boat or on the personal watercraft doing the towing
- New York State law requires any person between the ages of 10 and 18 to possess a boating safety certificate to operate any mechanically powered vessel, HOWEVER, ALL personal watercraft operators (jet skis, e.g.) MUST possess a safety certificate AND must be at least 14 years of age; for more information, please see <http://www.dec.ny.gov/environmentdec/19127.html>

### WEATHER RELATED HEALTH TIPS

When the weather heats up, try to limit heavy physical activities like walking, jogging, or lawn mowing to the cooler hours of the day. Dress appropriately and drink plenty of water. Over-exertion in hot, humid weather can lead to medical conditions related to heat - heat exhaustion and heat stroke. Children, elderly persons and those with weight or alcohol problems along with persons on certain medications or drugs very susceptible to heat reactions.

Never leave children, pets, or those who require special care in a parked car or vehicle during periods of intense summer heat even with the windows partially opened. Temperatures inside a vehicle can reach over 140 degrees Fahrenheit quickly. Exposure to such high temperatures can kill within a matter of minutes.

<p><u>Recognizing Heat Exhaustion</u></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Skin - pale, moist, clammy, cool</li> <li>• Body Temperature - normal</li> <li>• Other signs - dizzy, nauseated, weak</li> </ul>	<p><u>Treating Heat Exhaustion</u></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Have victim lie down in a cool spot, out of the sun</li> <li>• Give the victim plenty of fluids especially water</li> <li>• Offer a salty snack such as pretzels or saltines</li> </ul>
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With **heat stroke**, the body loses its ability to sweat even though the body's temperature continues to rise. It is a life-threatening medical emergency, the victim may suffer serious complications or even die if first aid measures are not immediately carried out.

<p><u>Recognizing Heat Stroke</u></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Skin - red, dry, hot</li> <li>• Body temperature - above normal (104+ degrees)</li> <li>• Other signs - confused, unconscious, convulsions</li> </ul>	<p><u>Treating Heat Stroke</u></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Call for emergency help at once</li> <li>• Get the victim out of the sun and in a cool spot</li> <li>• Remove the victim's clothing</li> <li>• Cool the victim's body by applying cool water</li> </ul>
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in the form of wet towels, sponges, spray from a hose or ice packs

- Monitor the victim's body temperature (stop cooling when it reaches 102 degrees F)
- Do not give anything by mouth to an unconscious person

#### DRINK PLENTY OF WATER!

Drink plenty of fluids, particularly water (at least 2-4 glasses of water per hour during extreme heat), even if you do not feel thirsty. If you wait until you are thirsty, you are already dehydrating. Your body needs water to keep cool. Avoid beverages containing alcohol or caffeine.

#### Fireworks and Outdoor Cooking Fire Safety



Every year Americans look forward to summer vacations, camping, family reunions, picnics, and the Fourth of July. Summertime, however, also brings fires and injuries due to fireworks and outdoor cooking. Annually, just under 10,000 Americans are injured by fireworks and almost 5,000 are injured by charcoal/wood-burning and propane grill fires.

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#### Special Needs Registry Program

This program is designed to assist the special needs community during an emergency that requires an evacuation within Albany County. Registrants must be physically unable to evacuate themselves from their residence without assistance. [Applicant information](#) will be entered into the County's E-911 system for retrieval during an emergency.

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#### National Grid Company - Life Support/Critical Care Program

*A listing of persons who would be at risk during extended power outages or evacuations.*

**Life Support/Critical Care** is a program available to National Grid customers who submit written documentation from their physician confirming that they or another member of the household requires electrically operated "life sustaining" medical equipment to maintain life. Examples of such life support medical equipment are:

- Apnea monitors
- Kidney dialysis devices
- Continuous ventilation devices
- Suction/aspiration equipment

Once National Grid receives written medical certification from the physician the company will conduct a home visit to verify the medical status and contact information. Once completed, National Grid will then take steps within its system to appropriately identify the customer's meter, the Customer Services System database and the company's Storm Board Operations and Regional Control Operations database, called NewLife. All Life Support customers are notified on a regular basis to verify correct program information and continued need.
