Over the last few months, I have been campaigning door-to-door and have had the opportunity to answer many resident questions about Town operations. Here are a few of the more commonly recurring questions that residents have asked.

How far are the sidewalks going on Feura Bush Road?

The current project includes the completion of a sidewalk on Elsmere Avenue and the construction of a new sidewalk on Feura Bush Road from Elsmere Avenue to Wemple Road. The long term plan is to build a sidewalk the entire length of Feura Bush Road from Route 9W to the Elm Avenue Park. We are applying for state funding to support the extension of the sidewalk along this route.

Why do we keep paving roads that appear to be in good shape?

Although it may appear to be in good shape, the road is likely deteriorating which causes the Town to repave. Like your paved driveway, road pavement dries out and crumbles over the years. Add to that the damage caused by snow plowing, road salt, and traffic, and a paved road's useful life extends only about 10 to 12 years. Roads are inspected prior to paving to ensure that we are not paving over roads that are in otherwise good condition and we extend the life of a road for as long as reasonable before repaving. We are also using alternative methods to extend the life of our existing roads to help reduce paving costs.

Why are so many police patrol cars parked at Town Hall?

The Town has a strong fleet management program designed to extend the life of our fleet and get the most from each of our vehicles. On average, our police patrol cars travel 28,000 to 30,000 miles per year. We manage our fleet to replace these vehicles every four years so the fleet size is designed to meet those objectives. Reducing the fleet size would require more frequent purchase and would not save

money. Based on the cost analysis we have done relative to the Police patrol car fleet, we believe the number of cars in the fleet is appropriate.

Why did we close the Elm Avenue Pool early this year?

Several factors came together this year that caused the Town to decide to close the complex on the last weekend of August; one week earlier than our normal Labor Day closing. Labor Day came very late in the season this year so from a seasonal perspective, the complex closure was close to the normal timeline. In addition, with our budget constraints, we were looking for ways to reduce costs without impacting services. We adjusted the pool opening time by one hour this summer and closed one week early which saved approximately \$15,000.00 this year. Finally, the early closure allowed us to begin work on the pool filter replacement project which started this fall.

Housing prices are falling; why isn't the Town reducing the assessment on my house?

Although your assessment is based on the value of your home, assessments do not float based on the market value of your home. Your assessment does not increase in a good market nor does it decrease in a slow market. The assessment is based on the value of your house at a fixed point in time. Our most recent assessment base date is July 1, 2005. The majority of homes that have recently sold here in Bethlehem have been purchased at prices higher than the property's assessed value. We continue to monitor our assessed values to determine if a reassessment is needed. Currently, those indicators lead us to believe that a reassessment of residential properties is not warranted.

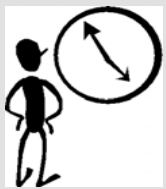

Wednesday, November 11 is Veterans' Day

Veterans Day is celebrated on November 11 in honor of those who have served in the armed forces of the United States. It is a legal federal and state holiday.

The observation was originally designated in 1919 by President Woodrow Wilson as Armistice Day. Wilson selected November 11 because the Armistice ending World War I had been signed on this date in 1918 - major hostilities of World War I were formally ended at the 11th hour of the 11th day of the 11th month of 1918 with the German signing of the Armistice. Wilson wanted to make sure that Americans did not forget the tragedies of the war. In 1938, Congress passed legislation which designated Armistice Day as a federal holiday. The name was changed to Veterans Day in 1954 so that all veterans would be honored. For a brief period (1971-1977), the holiday was celebrated on the fourth Monday in October.

NEW OPEN BURNING REGULATIONS WENT INTO EFFECT

October 14, 2009

Open burning is regulated by the New York State Statutory and Regulatory Authority - Environmental Conservation Law, 9.19, 6 NYCRR Part 215 – Open Fires. Part 215 bans open burning to all communities in New York State starting October 14, 2009.

Every time garbage is burned, especially in an uncontrolled fire, it creates air pollution. Smoke from a burn barrel may produce these air pollutants: Carbon monoxide, carbon dioxide, sulfur dioxide, halogenated hydrocarbons, dioxins, furans, volatile organic compounds, and heavy metals like lead, arsenic and mercury.

Burn barrel temperatures rarely exceed 500 degrees causing combustion to be incomplete. Pound per pound, garbage burned in a burn barrel gives off twice as many furans, 17 times as much dioxin and 40 times as much ash as a permitted incinerator.

In past generations garbage was burned because there were few alternatives. That practice should be a thing of the past. Garbage then did not contain plastics, foils, chlorine bleached paper and other materials. Burning trash in an open pit, burn barrel or a wood stove is unhealthy, un-neighborly and unnecessary.

Instead of burning: Reduce by buying in bulk or demanding less packaging on your favorite products.; Reuse by holding garage sales or donating reusable goods to a non-profit organization; Recycle newspaper, office paper, corrugated and single layer cardboard, magazines, aluminum, metals, acceptable plastics (bottles and plastic bags), books, tires and other items; Compost leaves and branches with the Town or in your backyard with food scraps. Recycle and dispose of waste properly with your hauler or at the town transfer station.

NEW YORK STATE BOTTLE BILL EXPANDED TO INCLUDE WATER BOTTLES

Amid the greatest economic crisis since the Great Depression, the Senate, Governor and Assembly passed a long-stalled Bigger Better Bottle Bill that had not passed the Senate in the previous nine sessions. Under this plan, water bottles will now be returnable like the current system for carbonated beverages. Water bottles account for approximately 70 percent of bottles entering our waste stream. Beginning October 30, 2009, water, including flavored or nutritionally enhanced water, which does not contain sugar, was added to New York's Bottle Bill.

Bottled Water facts from New York State:

- Single-serve bottled water is the fastest growing beverage of choice in the United States.
- Nearly 2.5 billion bottles of water a year are sold in New York alone-stacked up end to end, they'd reach the moon.
- 18 million barrels of crude oil equivalent were consumed in 2005 to replace the 2 million tons of plastic bottles that were wasted instead of recycled.
- Manufacturing that much plastic releases more than 800,000 metric tons of greenhouse gases into the atmosphere, contributing to global climate change.
- Bottled water costs as much as \$10 per gallon-tap water costs less than one cent per gallon.
- In New York, we spend \$2 billion per year to provide safe, clean drinking water to the public.

EPIC
(Elderly Pharmaceutical Insurance Program)

Help with prescription costs

EPIC is New York State's elderly pharmaceutical insurance program for people age 65 or older. There are two types of EPIC coverage, the fee plan and the deductible plan. If you qualify for this program, you can get three months of medications for \$20.00 or less. EPIC may cover your drug costs during the "doughnut hole" or "gap" in Medicare Part D. If you are single and your income is less than \$35,000, or married and your income is less than \$50,000, please contact one of the Outreach workers for more information.

Highway Department Frequently Asked Questions regarding fall pick-up

The Town's Fall Pick-up Program, more commonly referred to as Leaf Collection, has begun. From mid-October through mid-November, the Highway Department collects fallen leaves, grass clippings, and tree branches (four feet or less). Leaves must be placed in reusable containers or paper bags (sold at Town Hall, the Highway Department, Elm Avenue Park and the Rupert Road Transfer Station) or piled neatly along the sides of the road, not so high or so wide as to obstruct roadways or line of sight and not in the roadway itself. Placing debris into the roadway constitutes a violation of the Vehicle and Traffic law as well as creates a hazardous situation for pedestrian, bicycle and vehicular traffic. Please make sure that storm sewer inlets are also kept clean of leaves and branches to ensure proper drainage. To help give residents a general idea of when to expect leaf collection in their area of Town, a tentative pick-up schedule is posted on our web site and is updated daily, please see "Tentative Leaf Pickup Schedule" on the [Highway Department's web page](#). Please note that weather conditions play a major role in the adherence to the schedule.

Q. When can I rake leaves to the side of the road for pick up?

A. Leaves can be raked neatly to the side of the road from mid-October to mid-November or until all leaves are picked up pending no significant snowfall.

Q. What is the schedule for leaves to be picked up that are raked alongside the road?

A. Leaves are picked up by zones within the Town. Pick up starts in Zone 1 and works through each street until all the leaves are picked up in that zone. We then move to the next zone and continue the process until all zones have been picked up. To see which zone you are in, [click here](#).



Please note that weather conditions play a major role in the adherence to the schedule.

Q. What size tree limbs/branches can I put out for the Highway Department to pick up?

A. The Highway Department can pick up branches no bigger than 8" round in diameter and no longer than 6-7 feet long. They cannot weight more than 50 pounds each. They must be stacked neatly alongside the curb.

Yard Waste Paper Bags can be purchased, 3 for \$1 at the Highway Department, Elm Avenue Park, Town Hall, and Rupert Road Transfer Station.

Straight From the Storm Drain...

Stormwater Tips: **Hospitals and Healthcare Facilities**

If medical waste is not disposed of properly, it could block sanitary sewer pipes and cause a back up and overflow into the storm sewer. Some of medical waste is hazardous waste and if it gets into the storm sewer, it will be directly discharged into nearby water bodies and it could harm the environment.

- Whenever possible, use mercury free products
- Collect hazardous materials in a dedicated area and dispose of properly
- Do not mix x-ray fixer with developer
- Recycle mercury
- Eliminate non-essential incineration of medical waste



What is Stormwater Runoff?

Stormwater runoff is rain or melted snow that, instead of seeping into the ground, runs off into the storm sewer and into our waterways. It runs across rooftops, paved areas, bare soil, and sloped yards. On its way, the runoff picks up and transports soil, animal waste, salt, pesticides, fertilizers, oil and grease, debris and other potential pollutants. This polluted runoff degrades our lakes, streams, rivers, wetlands, and other waterways.

3rd Annual Bethlehem Holiday Parade

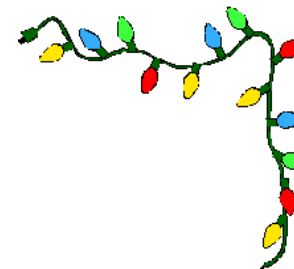
Friday, December 4th at 6:00 p.m.

Property Tax Amnesty Program

September 1 - November 30, 2009

Albany County is offering a **one-time only** amnesty program **CUTTING IN HALF** the amount of interest due on delinquent real property taxes owed to the County, which are paid from September 1, 2009 through November 30, 2009. Interest will return to the full amount due on December 1st.

Payment must be received by the County within the program time period to qualify. This program applies to interest only. No reduction of principal, penalties or other fees will be made.

Act now! This program will not be extended or repeated.

Installment Plans will be suspended during this period to allow taxpayers to take advantage of these reduced rates.

County foreclosure deed filings will be suspended until December 1, 2009. In December, foreclosure actions will resume. All taxes older than 2007 will be foreclosed in 2010.
