Over the past three years I have often written in this column about the financial condition of our Town and need to invest in our aging infrastructure. As I complete my term as Bethlehem Town Supervisor, those issues and concerns should remain our focus for the future.

We have made significant headway toward upgrading and repairing our aging and long neglected infrastructure. In 2010, we will complete a two-year, \$5 million project to replace some of our antiquated sewer pump stations. This year, we completed a comprehensive study of our water system and, based on the results of that study, we are now in the early stages of replacing our Vly Creek Reservoir Water Treatment facility. This year, we were also successful in securing Federal Stimulus funding to repair our South Albany Sewer District filter system which saved taxpayers \$480,000. We completed several sidewalk projects using state funding and we will build an additional sidewalk on Orchard Street next year as part of a "Safe Routes to School" grant we secured from New York State. We have begun work to replace the 35 year old water filter system at the Elm Avenue Park Pool facility and we have made investments in our technology infrastructure to help reduce the long-term costs of government operations. In addition we are continuing our successful road maintenance program to ensure that our Town roads do not deteriorate due to deferred maintenance.

This month, we will have in place a Capital Plan for our Town which will identify the infrastructure and facility projects that need to be addressed by the Town Government. The Town of Bethlehem is one of the few municipalities in New York State to have such a detailed and comprehensive plan. It will not only identify important capital projects, but improve our ability to forecast costs during the annual budgeting process. The Capital Plan will give us the tools necessary to create a multiple-year budget and allow us to smooth out spikes in expenditures to better manage our expenses.

In November, we announced that the Town's credit rating was upgraded to AA, providing us with access to a wider market for borrowing money. More importantly, the improved credit rating allows us to secure interest rates that are substantially lower than the ones we had been borrowing at previously. On our most recent bond issue, the reduced interest rate saved taxpayers \$341,000 over the life of the loan. As we use our bonding power to further advance infrastructure projects, the improved credit rating will greatly enhance our ability to borrow at very favorable interest rates.

Despite the Capital Plan and the improved credit rating, the ongoing maintenance and repair to our facilities and infrastructure is not without cost. Like all municipalities, we are working to secure state and federal funding to help defray the cost of projects to taxpayers. It is important, however, that residents support these projects and the continuation of important Town services. We must encourage our Town Government to prioritize and complete these projects to ensure that we are able to maintain the quality of life we, as Bethlehem residents, enjoy. By doing so, we not only ensure that Bethlehem remains a prime residential community in which to live, but we subsequently ensure that home values, which remain a prime investment for many of us, remain strong.

As I leave this position on December 31st, I want to thank you all for giving me the opportunity to serve as Bethlehem Town Supervisor. I have truly enjoyed this experience and I am proud of our many accomplishments during my term in office. I appreciate the support of all those residents who worked with me to improve our community and protect our environment. I will remain active and vocal in the coming years about issues that affect our Town and I look forward to my role as a private citizen.

I hope that you all enjoy a happy holiday season and a prosperous 2010.

Did You Know?



From the American Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals (ASPCA)

What are the dangerous substances pets should avoid during the holidays?

Holiday hazards include:

- Christmas tree water, which may contain fertilizers and bacteria that can upset the stomach if ingested
- Electrical cords
- Ribbons or tinsel, which can become lodged in the intestines and cause intestinal obstruction—this most often occurs with kittens
- Batteries
- Glass ornaments

Turkeys from the supermarket have a string in place to help lift them in and out of the roasting pan. These strings, after roasting, are delicious to our pets. If your pet finds a string in the trash they WILL EAT THEM. Strings in the intestinal tract of a pet can be FATAL and require emergency surgery to save them. Keep your pets safe by disposing of these strings in a zip lock bag and then removing them from your home.

Of course, there are usually a lot of delicious goodies floating around during the holidays, too — be sure to keep human treats inaccessible to your pets.

What are some dangers pets face during the cold winter weather?

The cold weather can bring about some surprising chemical dangers involving ice-melting products and antifreeze.

- After your cat or dog has been outside in the sleet, snow or ice, thoroughly wipe off his legs and stomach. If he licks his paws, he could ingest salt, antifreeze or other potentially dangerous chemicals. His paw pads may also bleed from snow or encrusted ice.
- Antifreeze, while essential to a car's cooling system, is very dangerous to your pets if they are exposed to it. Be sure to thoroughly clean up any spills from your vehicle, and consider using products that contain propylene glycol rather than ethylene glycol.

Sixty percent of residential heating related fires are the result of misuse or failure to properly maintain the heating equipment. With the high cost of fuels, many New Yorkers might be tempted to skimp on preventive maintenance, but that could be penny wise and pound foolish.

Furnaces and chimneys should be checked by a professional every year before the start of the heating season. Wood, pellet and coal stoves must be installed safely and correctly to order to ensure they properly and safely function. Space heaters may provide a little extra warmth in a cold or drafty corner or shop, but are not designed to replace household heating systems – use them sparingly.

Town's No Parking Ordinance in effect 11/1 - 4/15

REMINDER: Every year, the town has a "NO PARKING" ordinance that begins on November 1 and continues through April 15. The law prohibits vehicles from parking on town streets and highways between the hours of 1:00 a.m. and 7:00 a.m. Vehicles parked in violation of the "NO PARKING" ordinance may be ticketed and/or towed at the owner's expense.

Fall Leaf Pick-up Program is Winding Down

Vacuum trucks will be coming off the road soon. The Highway Department will continue to pick up loose leaf piles until the loose leaves are picked up **or** the weather stops this service.

The Highway Department suggests that leaves be bagged to ensure timely pick up. Bagged leaves and branches will continue to be picked up on your scheduled pick-up day throughout the winter, weather permitting.

The Town's Fall Pick-up Program collects fallen leaves, grass clippings, and tree branches (four feet or less).

Placing debris into the roadway constitutes a violation of the Vehicle and Traffic law as well as creates a hazardous situation for pedestrian, bicycle and vehicular traffic. Please make sure that storm sewer inlets are also kept clean of leaves and branches to ensure proper drainage.

To help give residents a general idea of when to expect leaf collection in their area of Town, a tentative pick-up schedule is posted on our web site and is updated daily, please see "Tentative Leaf Pickup Schedule" on the [Highway Department's web page](#). Please note that weather conditions play a major role in the adherence to the schedule.

A. The Highway Department can pick up branches no bigger than 8" round in diameter and no longer than 6-7 feet long. They cannot weight more than 50 pounds each. They must be stacked neatly alongside the curb.

Yard Waste Paper Bags can be purchased, 3 for \$1 at the Highway Department, Elm Avenue Park, Town Hall, and Rupert Road Transfer Station.

During the Holidays Reduce your Trash Footprint

More trash is produced during the holiday season than any other time of the year both at home and in businesses. You can reduce your trash footprint if you apply reuse, reduction, recycling and smart shopping to the holidays.

Reuse tablecloths, cloth napkins, dishes, glasses and silverware for all meals. That will mean full loads in the dishwasher and eventually full loads in the washing machine, a real energy savings. Never run appliances half empty,

Use leftover bread for stuffing, toast for croutons or feed to backyard birds. Left over salad dressings can become meat and vegetable marinades by adding a little olive oil to increase the volume. Clean the empty bottle with soap and water, drain and recycle it.

Most all plastic bags can be reused and excess bags recycled at grocery stores and chain stores over 5,000 square feet in size. The bags must be clean of paper, crumbs and other food waste. One can include dry cleaner, bread, newspaper delivery, and shopping bags.

Tins for popcorn, candy, and cookies can be saved for reuse or recycled with containers in your recycling bin. Make sure that tins are flattened so that they do not blow away or take up space in the bin.

Recycle boxes curbside by flattening to save space. Include corrugated (triple layer) and paperboard (single layer) cardboard as well as excess paper bags - together. Make sure that boxes are empty of contents before flattening. Most contents should go in the trash.

Catalogs increase at this time of year but they can be placed in the paper bags or recycle bin with your newspaper. You can put your office, home, mail items in there too and it is best to make sure that the paper does not blow around.

Reuse greeting cards as package tags or mail the fronts only of all greeting cards to St. Jude's Ranch For

Children, 100 St. Jude Street, Boulder City, NV 89005. These fronts become new cards that are later sold to raise funds for school operations. To purchase any of the finished cards, call (800)-492-3652 or go on-line: www.stjudesranch.org or recycle excess cards with mail items papers curbside.

Here are other quick tips: Polystyrene peanuts can go to Ship, Copy and More across from Delaware Plaza. Call if you have clean white foam blocks to recycle for you will have to go to another location. Leftover ice cubes could water your plants indoors or outdoors, rather than melt in the sink. Throw spent alkaline batteries in the trash and choose to purchase rechargeable batteries. All camera, button, rechargeable, lithium, lithium-ion and other strange batteries can be recycled at any town facility. When possible, purchase items with minimal or recyclable packaging. Go one step further and buy recycled content products. Don't forget the tote bags.

When finished with a live Christmas tree, leave it loose curbside for yard waste pickup. All ornaments and decorations must be completely removed. As per all yard waste, no plastic bags are acceptable. They will be ground up and composted at the Town's Compost Facility.
